Who are we?

On average, STFD responds to 1,000 emergency calls per year. The number of medical calls has been steadily rising every year and now makes up 65% off all calls. The fire station is manned 24/7. STFD is staffed with a day crew and a 24-hour shift officer. The day crew is backed up by a roster of Paid-on-Call firefighters who cover the station on nights and weekends with the shift officer.

Additionally, outside of duty shifts, Paid-on-Call staff respond to the station when necessary.

Extinguishing fires is just a part of the picture. In fact, only 13% of 911 calls are fire related. The other 87% are requests for Emergency Medical Services (EMS) such as heart attacks, car wrecks, drownings, home accidents, falls and community related support such as public safety education and assistance.

What do today's firefighters do?

Simply put, incident response.

Every incident begins with a call for help. All firefighters carry a radio or pager to receive 911 alerts. In addition, STFD uses the Active911 smart phone app to alert personnel of an incident and provide them with pertinent information about the call including location, directions, and a brief description of the type of emergency.

Firefighting tasks include:

- ▶ Pump operations
- > Hose/extinguisher fire attack
- > Ladder operations and ventilation
- > Forcible entry and search/rescue
- > Salvage operations and overhaul operations

Emergency Medical Service tasks include:

- Patient assessment and scene safety
- Provide pre-hospital basic treatment
- > Prepare patients for transport as necessary
- Complete required documentation and reports
- Assist ambulance crews with patient care as requested
- > Provide care and comfort to their families

Other Firefighter tasks include:

- Equipment and station maintenance
- > Fire prevention education
- > Public assistance
- > Training and continued education
