According to the Saugatuck Township Code of Ordinance Article III, Sec. 15-56, the Township of Saugatuck hereby finds that in order to protect the township and its general populace from extraordinary costs associated with providing for police, firefighting, rescue, and emergency medical services, it has become necessary to charge certain costs for providing these services. The township finds that this legislation is necessary to fairly allocate the costs among those responsible for them.

Saugatuck Township Fire District responded on 05/16/2018, to a one vehicle accident in the Southbound lane at the 40 mile marker on I-196 Hwy, and required patient extrication from the vehicle. It was discovered that the driver, Miss Emily Hiller was intoxicated with a blood alcohol level of .16 confirmed by Allegan County Sherriff's Department and was subsequently taken into custody. Units remained on scene until the vehicle could be safely towed. The Saugatuck Township Fire District experienced excessive costs during this call.

In accordance with our Cost Recovery Ordinance, dated 11/05/2008, we are required to recoup all costs associated with this call. The attached spreadsheets show the breakdown of our deployed resources

Your assistance is appreciated and expected in accordance with above mentioned ordinance. All fees associated with this call to be paid by 06/15/2018. If you wish to appeal, please follow the Appeals Procedure included.

Sec. 16-61 PROCEDURE FOR APPEALING ASSESSABLE COSTS.

(2) Any person determined to be a responsible party may appeal an invoice issued by the fire district to the fire district board. Appeals shall be submitted in writing to the fire chief by the date stated on the invoice, and shall describe the reasons why the appellant believes the assessment of costs was in error. Upon receiving an appeal, the appeal shall be placed on the agenda for the next available meeting of the fire district board, and the appellant shall have the opportunity to address the board. The fire district board shall promptly decide the appeal, and if the fire district board affirms the assessment of any costs those costs shall be due and payable to the fire district within 15 days of the decision.






ATF black passenger car approx. 150ft off of roadway in median. Car was into thick trees. Assisted ACSD Deputies through trees and branches. Vehicle had heavy front end damage, and drivers airbag had deployed. Cleared a path to passenger door and was able to open it. Drivers side was wedged along a 20" diameter tree laying on ground. Assisted PT out of vehicle to roadway to awaiting AMR ambulance. Turned PT over to AMR for further evaluation. PT refused transport with AMR, and was turned over to ACSD Deputies. PT blew a 0.16 and was transported to Allegan County Jail. Wrecker arrived, and needed inside lane to work safely, so adjusted arrowboard trailer, and cone line to move traffic to outside lane. Deployed flares next to cones at start of taper to ensure drivers could see cones. Assisted wrecker driver in pulling cable and removing car from thick trees. After wrecker left scene, demobilized cone line, and arrow trailer. All units cleared and returned to station.

INFORMATION – JOHANSON – 05/16/18

INCIDENT DATE/TIME: 05/16/18 at original time of 0251 hours

INCIDENT TYPE: This is in reference to a single car crash resulting in an OWI arrest.

INCIDENT LOCATION: Interstate 196 southbound near the 40 mile marker; this is located approximately one mile south of Blue Star Highway near exit 41.

INITIAL OBSERVATIONS: Upon arrival, I located a vehicle that was buried deep into the trees located in the median strip between north and southbound lanes. I made contact with the driver who was complaining of slight head pain, stating she bumped her head. She was also complaining of pain to her shin or knee area. Medical First Responders arrived on scene and began to treat the female driver. Shortly thereafter AMR arrived on scene. She was then escorted to the ambulance where they continued their examination and treatment of her. Eventually the female driver was treated and released by AMR with her refusing any further treatment and/or transport to a hospital. I clarified with AMR staff if this was an acceptable response. They stated that they found nothing that would prevent her from being able to make that decision.

SUSPECT: The suspect is identified as EMILY ANN HILLER, she's a white female, DOB MILLER CURRENT S. HILLER currently lives in the State of Michigan at 55 Ionia Avenue, Apt #911, in Grand Rapids, MI; however, she is currently licensed out of the State of Virginia. This is her original home of record and stated that she moved here approximately a year ago. MS. HILLER also stated that she is in the process of moving to a new location located in the Wyoming, MI area. MS. HILLER was identified by her Virginia driver's license upon request.

SUSPECT DRIVING: Evidence at the scene included the car buried deep in the trees in the median. Tire marks leading from the car back to the roadway indicating that the vehicle had been traveling southbound and made a gradual veer to the left until the vehicle finally left the roadway. It then went down in the median and continued at that same angle approximately 30 degrees off of center until the vehicle entered a stand of trees located in the median. The vehicle then plowed through those trees before coming to a rest against a tree which she struck with the frontend of her vehicle. Upon further investigation the vehicle suffered rear-end damage, front-end damage and damage to both sides as well as the roof. The vehicle was no longer drivable from the scene based on the amount of damage.

The vehicle itself is a 2008 Toyota Camry, black in color, Michigan registration DSH0426. That vehicle is registered to MS. HILLER at the company of the scene by Reliable Road Service out of Holland. Reliable was requested as a no preference wrecker.

DRIVER CONTACT: Upon contact with the driver, she appeared to be shaken; however, she was alert and coherent and able to speak in an understandable fashion. While awaiting EMS, I asked MS. HILLER to not move around. It was difficult for me to be able to get into the vehicle to access her to do any type of medical assessment prior to EMS arrival. MS. HILLER did provide her Virginia driver's license for identification purposes.

I asked MS. HILLER what had happened. She stated that she had gone to Virginia for business stating that she works for Perrigo. MS. HILLER stated that she flew from Virginia approximately 1830 hours on May 15, 2018. She went from there to Atlanta, GA where she had an approximately four hour layover. She stated upon leaving Atlanta at approximately 2230 hours on May 15, the plane then flew direct to Gerald R Ford International Airport. According to MS. HILLER upon arriving in Grand Rapids, she retrieved her baggage from the baggage claim, went out and proceeded to get in her car and drive home. MS. HILLER was quite surprised to discover that she had missed her exit by approximately 45 miles.

PRE-ARREST SCREENING: After MS. HILLER'S release from AMR's care and her refusal for further treatment, I did ask MS. HILLER to submit to the standardized field sobriety exercises. Prior to doing the exercises, I did verify with MS. HILLER that she did not have any preexisting conditions that would cause her to fall asleep such as narcolepsy, things like that, blood sugar issues where she would again pass out or anything like that. She did say that she does have indicating that sometimes she has but states that usually nothing happens with that. She states that she does not take medication for and states that normally she just has to eat something and that her condition is not a severe one. After ruling out any other possibilities for the manner in which she drove her car into the median and the fact that she missed her exit by 45 miles and didn't know it, I did ask MS. HILLER to submit to the dexterity exercises based on my observations of the odor and the fact that she stated she had been drinking in the Atlanta Airport. The results of the dexterity exercises are indicated on the worksheet portion of this test; however, they did substantially indicate that MS. HILLER was under the influence of alcohol.

PRELIMINARY BREATH TEST: After the dexterity evaluation exercises, I asked MS. HILLER to submit a sample to the Preliminary Breath Test instrument, which she did. At approximately 0400 hours a sample was submitted to the Preliminary Breath Test instrument which indicated a .162 breath alcohol content.

ARREST: MS. HILLER was taken into custody. She was placed in handcuffs. The handcuffs were checked for proper clearance and double locked. Ultimately MS. HILLER was transported to the Allegan County Jail without incident.

CHEMICAL TEST RIGHTS: I did read Chemical Test Rights to MS. HILLER and offered an explanation of those Chemical Test Rights as I understand them and then I did entertain MS. HILLER'S numerous questions about the Chemical Test Rights and her specific predicament. Chemical Test Rights were read at approximately 0455 hours and ultimately MS. HILLER did state that she understood them before proceeding with the actual Chemical Test.

CHEMICAL TEST: MS. HILLER did submit two breath samples to the DataMaster Evidentiary Test. The first sample was recorded at 0519 hours and resulted in a .14 breath alcohol content. The second sample was received at 0523 hours and also resulted in a .14 breath alcohol content.

LEIN:

CITATION: MS. HILLER was issued Citation #SD147319 for the misdemeanor charge of Operating While Intoxicated. MS. HILLER was given a verbal warning about failing to change her address as I explained to her she is required to do so immediately upon changing addresses.

EVIDENCE: While at the crash scene, I did take evidentiary photos of MS. HILLER'S vehicle as it followed along the trajectory crash path.

CONCLUSION: MS. HILLER was provided with a copy of the DataMaster Evidentiary Test. She was provided the 625G permit portion of the LEIN input form and she was provided the misdemeanor and civil infraction copies for the citation. MS. HILLER was also provided with my business card in the event that she had questions about her vehicle or anything else pertaining to this matter not of a legal nature. I was assisted on scene by Deputy REWA. Deputy REWA remained on scene while the vehicle was recovered by Reliable as I transported MS. HILLER to the Allegan County Jail.

At this point I have no further information. End of report; status closed. Copy forwarded to the Allegan County Prosecutor's Office for review.

Dear Fire Chief Janik:

I am writing on behalf of my client, Emily Hiller, the purpose of this letter is to appeal the invoice that was sent to her from Saugatuck Township Fire District requesting that she pay \$1,795 to the district. The invoice stems from a one car accident my client was involved in that your department decided to respond to sending what seemed to be every possible response unit your department had in its possession. In addition, it appears you sent every possible firefighter who was available and on duty as well.

My client was able to get out of her vehicle on her own and the fact that you were over zealous in your response to her accident shouldn't be held against her. 8 fire fighters, an engine truck, tanker truck, and three command trucks, seems to be an entirely unnecessary response to such an innocuous accident.

The reality is that the law enforcement officers who handle the initial response were perfectly capable of handling things and from the looks of the report you and your department did little to contribute in assisting at the scene and used this opportunity for a money grab to benefit your department. This is reinforced by the fact that you charged \$20 for postage as well as \$50 for document preparation.

It's difficult to address every single issue in this invoice but I will object to the hourly rates, number of fire fighters dispatched to the scene, number of vehicles dispatched to the scene, as

well as the fee charged per vehicle. In addition I will also dispute the amount charged for postage and document preparation on behalf of my client.

Mr. Jansma,

Our office represents the Saugatuck Township Fire District (the "Fire District"), which is in receipt of your correspondence dated June 12, 2018, sent on behalf of your client, Ms. Emily Hiller. In that correspondence, your office takes issue with the number of firefighters and vehicles dispatched to the scene of Ms. Hiller's May 16, 2018 car crash, as well as the fees charged for the same. You also dispute the cost of postage and document preparation.

You should be aware that Ms. Hiller was traveling on I-196 when her vehicle left the roadway and crashed into a wooded area. She was believed to be under the influence of intoxicating liquor at the time and could not be extracted from her vehicle until several small trees and brush were removed. She refused medical attention and was promptly arrested and transported to the Allegan County jail. In all, this was a serious crash that resulted in one lane of I-196 being closed and a lengthy vehicle recovery process. It is fortunate that neither your client nor others were seriously injured in the crash, but hindsight is 20/20 and the Fire District did not know that when dispatching its personnel. When viewed in the full context of the location and nature of the crash, the Fire District believes that the costs assessed to Ms. Hiller are quite reasonable. Nonetheless, Ms. Hiller has disputed the same and asks that the question be scheduled for an appeal hearing.

Accordingly, and consistent with Section 16-61(2) of Saugatuck Township's Code of Ordinances, this matter will be placed on the Fire District Board's (the "Board") July 16, 2018 agenda. This meeting of the Board will convene at 4:00 pm at 3342 Blue Star Highway, Saugatuck, MI 49453. Please be prepared to address Ms. Hiller's concerns with the Board at that time.

The goal of this project is to replace personal protective equipment (PPE) in accordance with applicable National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) Standards.

NFPA requires that all personal protective equipment be replaced after 10 years. Due to the increased toxins from modern synthetics burning, our goal is to provide each personnel a compliant set of PPE. This allows the current PPE to become backup gear, and to be worn while the primary set is being washed and doing our best to eliminate carcinogens. In cycling this rotation, we will always remain compliant with NFPA standards regarding PPE replacement.

The District has budgeted funds to purchase 7 sets annually, and currently we are requesting to replace 6 sets. A set of turnout gear includes structural firefighting PPE, as well as wildland firefighting PPE. Additionally, personnel researched 5 different vendors for NFPA compliant PPE. The vendor selected was the most comfortable, durable, and cost-effective PPE.
